

Start your discovery at the two Historical Villages closest to Castelo Rodrigo and continue on to the rest.


ALMEIDA 21km

Protected by an imposing wall, in the shape of a star, this square was fundamental in defending and maintaining our independence and border. The beauty of its construction, admired from the saddle of a horse, is the best tribute to the valiant people of Almeida.









This castle has a fascinating history which began in the mists of time, when in nearby Côa, schist canvas was already being made. It is so noble that a Roman city fell asleep at its foot, whose name is known. But it is at its very summit, between the roofless walls and centuries-old olive trees that we feel like we are inside. There is no excuse for putting off this visit.






CASTELO RODRIGO VILLAGE WITH THE GOLDEN WALLS

A monument of our history, the Historical Village of Castelo Rodrigo bears witness in stone to all the events which built a border between two kingdoms. Already occupied during the Muslim era, it walls were built by King Alfonso IX of León. When the kingdom of Portugal was reinstated in 1297 by the Treaty of Alcanices, King Dinis made it a symbol by reconstructing the castle.

Since the times of the reign of León, its Rocamadour church has been a stopping point for pilgrims from Santiago. Moors and Jews lived here, some of whom were famous, such as the doctor, Efraim Bueno. It is really worth visiting and listening to Castelo Rodrigo.

Main Palace Gate Main entrance to the castle, which was later adapted, in 1590, for the palace and residence of Cristóvão de Moura.







CRISTÓVÃO DE MOURA PALACE

In 1590, where the old citadel was located, the palatial residence of Count Cristóvão de Moura e Távora, future Marguis of Castelo Rodrigo, was built. After the Restoration of Independence, in 1640, the population set fire and looted the palace, although the Marquis had already died, far away from here, in 1613.

Crosslet Loopholes

Openings in the shape of a "T" which served to support artillery and provide a protected view of the besieger.

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Main Parish Church of Rocamadour First mentioned in 1209, it preserves important sacred works inside.

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Medieval Cistern Cistern with two doors from different periods, the one with an overpassed arch being the oldest, dating back to the end of the 10th century. It is 13 metres deep
