IDANHA-A-VELHA 15km




CASTELO NOVO 47km

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

MONSANTO

THE STRENGTH **OF STONE**

The Monsanto inselberg is part of a granite archipelago which rises to an altitude of 762 metres. There is a happy symbiosis here between both architectures: the natural one, from the utter chaos of the barrocais (irregular rock and boulder formations), and the human one, which adapted the boulders in an almost rupestrian architecture. From there, legends and stories of sieges and monsters were born, typical of the wild nature of the area. This embrace between rocks and men earned national recognition, when in 1938 the title of "Most Portuguese" Village" was awarded to Monsanto in a national competition. Later, it gained greater projection and opp<mark>ortunity, with its integration</mark> in the network of Historical Villages, which made Monsanto a tourist destination with history. With a castle that goes back to the days of Portugal's original design, full of happy and bitter moments, the country's history can be recounted here.











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The oldest site is located at the summit, where the Templars

built an enclosure with a Keep. Another structure with evenly

spaced towers was later added, with two uneven enclosed

Arch of the Chapel of São João Ruins of a chapel, probably built in the mid-16th century in the Manueline style. Today, its arch is a landmark in the extensive landscape.





Marafona These ragdolls, without eyes or mouths, were traditionally made for the Festa das Cruzes ("Festival of Crosses") in May, protecting houses from thunderstorms







Chapel of São Pedro de Vir-a-Corca

An important Romanesque testament to Beira Baixa, set in the earthy landscape and dating back to the beginning of the 13th century. The legend of the hermit, Santo Amador from the late Middle Ages, is associated with this Chapel



The adufe is a traditional percussion instrument from this region, played by women and similar to the Mirandês tambourine, but different in technique and sound. It is not clear when it was introduced in this area, but it is represented on an extraordinary Islamic vase from Tavira.
