From here Pedro Álvares Cabral left to discover Brazil and it was also here that Jewish people arrived in search of a place to live in peace. The streets and their significant museums are worth visiting, as is the landscape which truly justifies its name.







It is set apart by its impossible houses located amongst the round boulders, the lofty, dominant, impregnable castle and a vast landscape which can only be seen from the top of this stone island. There are no arguments against coming here. And it is important to remeber that this is the most "Portuguese" village in Portugal.

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

SORTELHA VILLAGE OF THE STONE RING

The high and robust wall, resembling an old ring, guards streets and squares since the time when Sortelha was a Manueline town. As soon as you pass the Town Gate, you will be welcomed by the old nettle tree, while the Keep maintains watch over the sleeping village. And arriving at the castle gates, admire the Pillory Square and the old Town Hall, while the steep climb announces the beautiful Main Parish Church. The irregular stone steps lead you to the top of the bell tower, where you can pause to breathe purity. The beauty observed from this vantage point is the reward, but Sortelha offers so much more. Go through the New Gate and next to the ruined Church of Mercy, spend time contemplating the highest mountain range in mainland Portugal.

EIGHT HUNDRED YEARS OF HISTORY

The fortress, whose construction was ordered by D. Sancho I, is a typical rock castle built on an imposing rock formation, with an isolated keep. Sortelha was only granted a charter in 1228 by King Sancho II and was the seat of a vast council term until 1855. It gained greater prominence during the reigns of King Dinis and King Manuel who, in 1510, granted it a new charter, to stimulate its repopulation.

Pillory Manueline pillory, with a board, was built in 1510 as a symbolic act commemorating the attribution of the Manueline Charter. 3 Eternal Kiss Allegory of forbidden love transformed into an eternal kiss. This is why Sortelha is a place of poetic inspiration and a serves as a stage for films and written novels.





Leaving the walled centre through the New Gate, you come across a set of buildings set in a wide, open space with a stunning landscape. It is comprised of the former Hospital of Mercy, the ruins of the Church of Mercy/Santa Rita (or São João, according to the Parish Memories) and the Chapel of Santiago in the old cemetery.
